



FIRST SCRIPTURE LESSON: Isaiah 40:1-9

(ESV) Comfort, comfort my people, says your God. (2) Speak tenderly to Jerusalem, and cry to her that her warfare is ended, that her iniquity is pardoned, that she has received from the LORD's hand double for all her sins. (3) A voice cries: "In the wilderness prepare the way of the LORD; make straight in the desert a highway for our God. (4) Every valley shall be lifted up, and every mountain and hill be made low; the uneven ground shall become level, and the rough places a plain. (5) And the glory of the LORD shall be revealed, and all flesh shall see it together, for the mouth of the LORD has spoken." (6) A voice

says, "Cry!" And I said, "What shall I cry?" All flesh is grass, and all its beauty is like the flower of the field. (7) The grass withers, the flower fades when the breath of the LORD blows on it; surely the people are grass. (8) The grass withers, the flower fades, but the word of our God will stand forever. (9) Go on up to a high mountain, O Zion, herald of good news; lift up your voice with strength, O Jerusalem, herald of good news; lift it up, fear not; say to the cities of Judah, "Behold your God!"

SECOND SCRIPTURE LESSON: Philippians 4:4-9

(ESV) Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, rejoice. (5) Let your reasonableness be known to everyone. The Lord is at hand; (6) do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. (7) And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus. (8) Finally, brothers, whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence, if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things. (9) What you have learned and received and heard and seen in me—practice these things, and the God of peace will be with you.

Isaiah 40 Revisited

Imagine a vast desert at the edge of dawn. The world still sleeps beneath a canopy of deep blue, the last stars flickering like tired lamps in the sky. A thin band of gold begins to push upward along the horizon—not enough to brighten the land, but enough to promise that darkness is losing its grip. In the foreground kneels a lone exile beside a dry riverbed. His garments are covered with dust, his hands rest loosely in his lap, and his shoulders sag beneath the accumulated weight of years lived under guilt, regret, and longing. He is not simply tired; he is dispirited, inwardly convinced that the story of his life has become an abandoned one.

Into that stillness steps the Lord's messenger. He comes silently, without spectacle, without the rumble of distant thunder or the blaze of consuming fire. Instead, he brings with him something much gentler—presence. The light around him is not harsh but warm, as though the dawn itself were drawing nearer in his company. He does not seize the exile by the arm or command him to stand. He simply kneels beside him, placing himself within reach, so that even the posture of the messenger preaches its own kind of promise.

Then he speaks the first word heaven intends for weary sinners to hear: "Comfort." The word lands not as a suggestion but as a declaration. It is not a platitude or a thin reassurance. It is God's own assignment: Comfort My people. Comfort them because I am not finished with them. Comfort them because their sins are forgiven. Comfort them because I am coming to them Myself.

As that word settles over the moment, the desert begins to change. The jagged stones that once made the path treacherous now seem to ease themselves into the earth. The uneven ground lifts. The deep valleys rise with a slow, steady gentleness. What once looked impossible to cross now stretches forward like a road intentionally built for the arrival of a king. The barren landscape is becoming a prepared place.

The exile lifts his face, blinking against the softening darkness, and looks toward the messenger. Behind the herald, the horizon grows brighter, unveiling a radiance that no longer belongs to morning but to Majesty. And the messenger's voice continues—not merely describing the future but unveiling a present reality: "Behold, your God!"

Not a distant God... Not a reluctant God... Not a God waiting for you to climb up to Him. A God who comes with might and tenderness, who gathers lambs in His arms and carries them close to His heart.

Here, in this unfolding scene, the exile at last understands: the comfort spoken to him is not the comfort of improved circumstances, nor the comfort of positive thinking, nor the comfort of pretending the past did not happen. It is the comfort of God Himself drawing near with forgiveness, declaring that the hard sentence of judgment has been lifted, and that the exile is not forgotten but restored.

And now, the desert of Isaiah becomes your own. For Scripture paints this picture not as a distant memory but as a present mercy. You, too, know what it is to feel exiled—estranged by sin, weighed down by sorrows you cannot always easily name, surrounded at times by landscapes that feel barren and unending. You know what it is for life to press in from every angle. You may know all too well how quietly questions accumulate in the heart: "Is God near? Does He care? Does He remember me?"

Isaiah would have you see yourself in that kneeling figure at dawn. For the same God who sent comfort to His ancient people sends comfort to you now—not in the form of simple encouragement, but in the form of His Son. Jesus is the One who steps into your desert, who speaks forgiveness into your failures, who lifts your face to see that the horizon is not empty but filled with the radiance of His coming. He is the Shepherd who gathers you, the King who levels the mountains of guilt, the Lord who makes straight the twisted paths of doubt and fear.

And your deserts, too, begin to shift. Not always outwardly—not always in ways visible to others—but inwardly, as the comfort of

Christ smooths the roughness of your fears, raises the low valleys of despair, and straightens the crooked paths of mistrust. One word from Him can re-draw the landscape of the heart.

"Comfort, comfort My people," He says still. Not because you have earned it, but because He has chosen you. Not because you are strong, but because He is your strength. Not because you see the way forward, but because He is already on His way toward you to comfort You with His forgiveness.

And so the picture ends with the exile rising—not because he found strength within himself, but because the voice that called him now gives him new life. The dawn has fully broken. The King is near. And all flesh shall see the salvation of God.



Daily Bible Readings for Home Devotions December 15 - December 20, 2025

Mon Matthew 11:2-10 When John sends disciples to ask Jesus to confirm His Messiah-ship, He points to the prophecies which He has fulfilled. He then turns and extols John's role in the coming Kingdom of God.

Tues Romans 10:9-15 It is with heart and mouth that Jesus is honored and salvation is enjoyed by both Jew and non-Jew. The Lord our righteousness provides preachers of the gospel to speak to the heart.

Wed Matthew 1:18-23 The Lord appears to Joseph in a dream to let him know that Mary has not been unfaithful to her promise. This miracle of God-with-us is not something Joseph or we would have thought up.

Thurs Isaiah 60:1-5 The coming of the LORD means the coming of light in darkness and nations will be drawn to that light. As John also writes: "In him was life, and the life was the light of mankind" (Jn1:4).

Fri Psalm 98 Although Jesus' coming in Bethlehem was without earthly fanfare, His coming to judge the earth will be reason for shouting and singing and sounding of trumpets. Joy to the world, the LORD is come!

Sat Psalm 4 God's children may have troubles, but they know that all blessings come from the LORD. To Him they will look and from Him receive greater joys than worldly prosperity can bring (v7).
